The history form that is to be used is enclosed. This is the <u>approved form</u> from the Nebraska School Activities Association website and is the only form to be used. The form needs to be given to the parents to complete and sign and then sent back with the student at the time of the physical so we can release the information to the school. The forms need to be signed by the parent <u>twice</u> and those places are highlighted. It is very important that it has these signatures by the parent at the bottom of the form or the physical form will be held at the clinic until we have a signature. As in the past, the student will need to have a urine specimen checked and it is preferred that this be the first morning specimen of the day. It is important that the first morning specimen is refrigerated until it is brought to the school. The cost of the physical will be \$30.00 and needs to be paid at the time of the physical. The check should be made payable to Central Nebraska Medical Clinic. When the students are all cleared, we will send the physicals to the school.

2014 SPORTS PHYSICALS CENTRAL NEBRASKA MEDICAL CLINIC

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Walk-ins only: No appointments will be taken. Physicals will be done on a first come first serve basis.
- 2. Sports physicals will be performed for students who will be in 7th grade through 12th grade and participating in sports activities in the 2014/2015 school year. No immunizations will be given at the time of the physicals.
- 3. Parents are welcome to participate but are not required to be present as long as they have signed their portion of the medical history form.
- 4. The student/guardian portion of the medical history form needs to be completed and signed by the guardian. The student will need to bring this history form to the office at the time of the physical. There will be extra history forms available, however, time will go smoother if the form is completed and signed before the student arrives. The physical will not be sent to the school until the history form has been signed by the parent/guardian.
- 5. A urine sample will be checked as part of the physical. The first morning specimen is preferred and can be collected in a clean container, marked with the student's name and brought to the clinic anytime during the day of the physical. It must be refrigerated if it can't be delivered to the clinic prior to the physical.
- 6. Students will not need to take their clothes off for the exam. However, boys will be checked for hernias and are encouraged to dress appropriately.
- 7. The cost of the exam is \$30.00 and is to be paid at the time of check-in, no exceptions. Checks should be made payable to Central Nebraska Medical Clinic. If additional physicals are done at the same time, there will be an additional charge.
- 8. The signed physical forms including the clearance to participate portion will be sent to the school following the physicals.
- 9. If there are any abnormalities noted at the time of the physical, the healthcare provider will discuss this with the student and/or guardian.
